Chair Duncan thanked all of the speakers for their presentations.

D. NEW BUSINESS

1. Recognition of Student Representative

Superintendent Green welcomed Isha Rattu, student representative from Spectrum Community School.

2. Aboriginal Education Annual Report

Craig Schellenberg, District Principal, Aboriginal Nations Education, and Louise Sheffer, Director, Learning Team, presented the committee with an overview of the Aboriginal Education Department, including the targeted goals and coordinated efforts being made to improve achievement rates for indigenous students. Mr. Schellenberg and Ms. Sheffer informed the committee of several initiatives currently underway, including a pilot program with BC Transit to provide universal bus passes to approximately 70 secondary students living on reserve, and the implementation of new programs, such as Elders in Schools.

Trustees and stakeholders asked questions of clarification. Chair Duncan thanked Mr. Schellenberg and Ms. Sheffer for their informative presentation.

3. Feminine Hygiene Products in Schools

Trustee Painter presented his motion and rationale.

It was moved by Trustee Painter:

That the Board of Education of School District 61 (Greater Victoria) direct the Superintendent to study the feasibility of providing free tampons and pads in District Schools and report back their findings at the next Ed Policy meeting.

Trustees discussed the motion and an amendment was proposed.

Update

On April 23, 2018 the Board of Education passed a motion to adopt Policy 5132 – STUDENT DRESS CODE. As stated in the policy, the Board recognizes that decisions about dress reflect individual expression of identity, socio-cultural norms, and economic factors and are intensely personal. Since the policy was adopted several conversations have occurred with principals and vice principals when questions have arisen and also as a means to continue the dialogue.

As per the regulation, principals continue to ensure that the Student Dress Code is limited to the criteria outlined in District Policy Subsections 3.1.1 (health and safety concerns); and 3.1.2 (drug and alcohol, offensive language or images and discrimination concerns); and annually review the procedures with students, staff and parents.

As principals annually review the school code of conduct with their staff, students and parents, it is expected that Student Dress Code will be reviewed at this time.

On occasion when district staff hear of a concern regarding the implementation of the policy and regulation, we immediately seek to clarify and resolve the concern.

RE: Mental Health and Wellness Supports and Early Action Initiatives Grant

Update

The Ministry of Education provided SD 61 with a grant in the amount of \$30,300 to support mental health and wellbeing promotion for our school community. The grant funding is part of a health care funding agreement between the Government of Canada and the Province of British Columbia.

The intention of the funding was to:

- Use existing student data to fund new/enhanced mental health and well-being activities;
- Support districts to design action plans to capture how funding is spent and what outcomes are achieved;
- Support districts to engage with First Nations, Metis, Inuit and off-reserve Aboriginal population in the development of the action plan;
- Support the development of an evidence-based, inclusive approach for promotional mental health supports for educators, students and/or families; and
- Provide one-time only funding as a starting point for an integrated and sustainable health infrastructure in the district, considering the approaches of Social and Emotional Learning, Mental Health Literacy and Trauma Informed Practice.

In accordance with conditions placed on all government grants, we must use all grant funds only for the purpose outlined above and by providing the Ministry a report outlining how the funding has been used or will be spent before the end of the 2018/2019 school year.

It was determined through conversations with students, parents, staff and administrators that the funding would be to support following ongoing or new initiatives:

- SnapShots for Students in grades K-12 focusing on Social Emotional Learning
- Roots of Empathy
- Love is Love Conference
- Second Step
- Mindfulness for Educators
- Social Emotional Wellness Advocates
- Physical Literacy Pilot

Deliverables:

- Human Resource allocations
- Programming
- The distribution of financial resources

Membership:

- Two Trustees
- Superintendent or designate
- Three school administrators, one each from elementary, middle, and high School
- Three representatives from the Greater Victoria Teachers' Association
- One representative from the Canadian Union of Public Employees Local 382
- One representative from the Canadian Union of Public Employees Local 947
- One representative from the Allied Specialists' Association
- One representative from the Victoria Confederation of Parent Advisory Councils
- One representative from each of the Esquimalt and Songhees Nations
- Two student representatives from the Representative Advisory Council of Students

Timeline:

- Provide budget feedback to the board annually by February.
- Provide updates and recommendations to the Operations Policy and Planning Committee and Education Policy Committee throughout the year.

Voting:

• It is expected that the committee will use a consensus model for decision making. When this is not possible, decisions will be made by majority vote.

Procedural Notes:

- It is anticipated that the committee will liaise with other committees to inform the work of these committees.
- The committee will be able to seek information from District staff and outside sources as determined by the committee.

Update:

The One Equitable Learning Community Committee was established as a committee that could blend the work of the One Learning Committee and the Equity Committee. The Committee is comprised of two trustees, Superintendent designates, 3 school administrators and representatives from GVTA, CUPE 382, CUPE 947, ASA, VCPAC, both Nations, and student representatives when available.

The committee has met three times between December 2018 and March 2018.

The following topics were discussed:

- The purpose of the blended committee
- Creating a draft Terms of Reference for the new committee structure
- Moving forward with committee work
- What the committee work could potentially be

Members of the committee collaborated to create a draft Terms of Reference for the One Equitable Learning Community Committee. There was considerable conversation regarding the blending of the committees and what the work of this committee would be.

After reviewing the work of both committees, it was decided that the draft Terms of Reference better outlined the work of the Equity Committee and the committee agreed that the work of the One Learning Community Committee was completed.

Recommendations:

- 1. The work of the One Equitable Learning Community Committee be archived.
- 2. The One Learning Community Committee be dissolved and the work archived.
- 3. The draft Terms of Reference be considered by the board and future committee work be based on this new revised Terms of Reference.
- 4. The committee work continue under the name of the Equity Committee.
