Background

The purpose of this memo is to update the Committee on the next iteration of the Long Term Facilities Plan by way of the Board's Long Term Facilities Plan Ad Hoc Committee (LTFPAHC).

The plan is now two years old and should be updated for the following reasons:

- 1. Conclusion of the boundary/catchment review in Spring 2019 has changed asset pool and enrolment, impacting capacity information;
- 2. The Victoria High School land exchange and the long term lease was the first transaction with a public body partnership as recommended in the plan.
- 3. The Board's June 2019 resolution to commit to climate emergency and sustainability
- 4. A more detailed pathway is required to provide rich learning environments, meet future enrolment growth, maintain health and safety of students and staff, sustainability, improve asset base, revenue generation, and capital planning.

In November, Trustee Hentze, Director Morris, Associate Secretary-Treasurer Stride and the Secretary-Treasurer met to plan for the LTFPAHC's next meeting. During that meeting, revisions to the Terms of Reference were suggested and are attached in draft. Highlights of suggested changes are:

- A recommitment to developing more a more refined plan
- Adding the Associate Secretary-Treasurer as a member
- Increasing student voice from one student to three
- Recommendations by consensus

Action:

That the Board of Education approve the revised Terms of Reference for the Long Term Facilities Plan Ad Hoc Committee as presented.

Facilities Plan Ad Hoc Committee Terms of Reference

Purpose:

The Facilities Plan Committee originally was an ad hoc committee established by the board for the purpose of developing a Long Term Facilities Plan. As the Plan is now finished The purpose of the revised committee is to develop recommendations, and to update and monitor the implementation of the District's Long Term Plan.

Deliverables:

The Facilities Plan Committee will

- 1. develop recommendations, and update and monitor the implementation of the Long Term Facilities Plan recommendations;
- 2. Update the plan, and any recommendations, bi-annually

Membership:

The committee will be comprised of the following 18 members:

- One Trustee appointed by the Board Chair;
- The Superintendent or delegate, the Secretary Treasurer, Associate Secretary-Treasurer, and the Director of Facilities;
- One appointed member from each of the District's employee groups: GVTA, ASA, CUPE 342 and 947, VPVPA;
- Three parent representatives; one delegate from each of Elementary, Middle and Secondary schools, and representing three different municipalities. Selection of parents first by VPPAC; then by District if VPPAC members not forwarded;
- A Three Greater Victoria students;
- One Representative from the Esquimalt Nation
- One Representative from the Songhees Nation

Timeline:

The Facilities Plan Committee will report at the Operations Policy and Planning Committee up to two times per year.

The Facilities Plan Committee may also present to the Education Policy and Directions Committee as necessary.

Voting:

As the purpose is to monitor the implementation of the Long Term Facilities Plan there is no voting. Recommendations to be made by consensus. If consensus cannot be reached, multiple options will be reported to committee.

RE: George Jay Consultation Results

Background:

In September 2019, the Board of Education passed a motion to develop a consultation process that explored changing the name of George Jay Elementary School. The motion was in response to concerns brought forward from community members about segregationist policies that were championed by George Jay while he was Board Chair from 1907-1934.

The policies passed specifically excluded Chinese Canadian students from attending specific schools until they had passed an English exam.

In October, the District released an online survey to gather input on the possibility of renaming or keeping the name of George Jay Elementary. More than 2,500 people participated. In addition, an open house was held at the school for people to share their input and for some their personal experiences.

Attached is the survey results and all the input collected from the open house.

Next steps:

Based on the public engagement plan, if the Board supports the decision to rename the school it would direct the Superintendent to form a naming committee to develop new school name options.

Recommended Motion:

That the Board of Education of School District No. 61 (Greater Victoria) direct the Superintendent to establish a committee that explores new naming options for George Jay Elementary School.

George Jay Potential Name Change Consultation: Engagement Summary Report: November 25, 2019



INTRODUCTION

In September 2019, the Board of Education passed a motion to develop a consultation process that explored changing the name of George Jay Elementary School. The motion was in response to concerns brought forward from community members about segregationist policies that were championed by George Jay while he was Board Chair from 1907-1934.

The policies passed specifically excluded Chinese Canadian students from attending specific schools until they had passed an English exam.

THE PROCESS

In October, the District released an online survey to gather input on the possibility of renaming or keeping the name of George Jay Elementary. More than 2,500 people participated.

In addition, an open house was held at the school on Wednesday, November 6, 2019 from 6:00-8:30 p.m. where approximately 50 came to share their input and some of their own personal experiences. Feedback was captured via comment cards.

To ensure the survey and open house was broadly communicated to raise awareness and build relationships with interested stakeholders.






Overall Key Themes in Survey:

- Calculate the costs of the name change (signage, stationary, etc.)
- Rename the school but create a space or plaque to honour George Jay
- Develop a policy, stating why you are proceeding with the name change
- Consider renaming the school the following:
 - A name that recognizes the First Nations and Traditional Territory
 - A name that recognizes the Chinese Canadian Community
 - North Park Elementary

Do we want future generations to measure us by the one or two values that preoccupy them? Or do we want them to recognize the full complexity of our situation as we faced it? adopt a smug and self-serving attitude towards the past. The Chinese community is strong, resilient, and reasonably affluent. They do not need the condescension implicit in this proposal. Instead of changing the name, how about spending one afternoon a year teaching students about Jay's legacy, positive and negative. Done properly, that will be of far more value and will do more to unify and strengthen our communities than these sorts of pseudo-moral gestures.

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



Update for November 2019 Capital Projects, Operations, Transportation & Planning

SOUTH PARK ELEMENTARY

The original roof on South Park (well over 100 years) has begun to have problems. Some of the slate is breaking down and areas had developed leaks. Upon investigation we also discovered

the old turret on the roof was rapidly deteriorating and leaking. The immediate leaks were repaired and the turret was removed to be rebuilt. Pictured here is the rebuilt turret with the copper finish. It will last another 100 years from the sounds of it! The main roof of the school is destined to be replaced during summer 2010. We are using a slate product that is very close to

what the original is. We have conferred with the Heritage staff to ensure what we do is in compliance with those values.

HEALTH & SAFETY

Facilities has a new Health and Safety Officer. He has spent the past 7 years in OH&S and is certified. Brian Started working on civil projects such as bridge building and coordinator of workers and safety programs. The bulk of his tenure to date has been in oil and gas in the north where OH&S is taken extremely seriously. We look forward to his expertise and working with him.

QUADRA WAREHOUSE

The refurbishing of the Quadra Warehouse posed some challenges as we had abatement to take care of before doing some upgrades such as removing old floor coverings, installing new covering or refurbishing what we found underneath, electrical upgrade, painting, plumbing renewal and upgrade HVAC system (new forced air high efficiency gas furnaces with the addition of a large heat recovery ventilation (HRV) unit. Below are a couple of photos showing differences.









MAJOR CAPITAL

With Vic High starting to ramp up, Jim has been very busy working through logistical items with the Architect and Engineers as well as attending meetings. While doing this he is also dealing with the ongoing Seismic upgrade at Braefoot and renovation at the old SJ Willis facility. When he tires of that he is still working with the Ministry on Cedar Hill replacement, Shoreline seismic and Reynolds seismic proposal.

Our Major Capital Division is very busy maintain the work flow to ensure we have ongoing upgrades taking place.

MINOR CAPITAL REPORT

The facilities capital employees have been hard at work finishing a number of projects. In November the sensory room and VCPAC offices at Victor were completed. The inclusive playground has been ordered for Braefoot. The Seismic Upgrades in blocks 1 and 4 at Campus View, the site prep at Vic West child care and the retaining wall for the Tolmie Trades building have all been completed .

The roofing contractors completed the roofs at Richmond and the annex roof and copula at South Park. In December the capital employees will be finishing these:

- the shaft wall (fire separation) at Artimus, the Archives space at Tolmie,
- the outdoor classroom at Braefoot,
- prepping the rest of the Tolmie Trades site in preparation for the building installation,
- the second child care unit at Frank Hobbs which will then be licensed by the end of December for student arrival in the new year.
- The new inclusive spaces at Sir James Douglas will be done by Christmas
- preparation is underway for the next few sites (Tillicum, Marigold and Craigflower).
- The remediation at Victor will be complete in December to allow for the capital employees to start installing the vinyl board in all rooms.

A few new projects that have arrived in the Capital Department are the abatement and repair of the portable at Marigold, the sagging floor and ventilation in room 10 at Doncaster and preparations for Richmond school becoming the new annex to Lansdowne for the cohort of grade six students.

Facilities are working with the City of Victoria and the Architect to prepare for the arrival of one portable unit at George Jay and two portable units at Sundance, which will be the first builds out of the Tolmie Trades building.

FACILITIES MAINTENANCE

November was another extremely busy month with 1,134 Repair Maintenance Service Requests created and 770 completed.

As we begin preparation for the winter months we have outfitted our two trucks with brining machines and snow plows to begin minor brining when required and then move into full brining routes to our school driveways and hills that approach so our parents and buses can

safely get to their destinations. We have stocked up on salt to be distributed to the schools and staff to be used on sidewalks and pathways if we have snow fall. We also outfitted one of our small Kubota back hoes with snow removal equipment to help speed up our removal time when we are deployed. We have also purchased a few more snow blowers to help with our team's backs and decrease snow removal time even further. Each zone team will be given one snow blower to be deployed at their discretion. If we do receive snow fall we feel we are prepared to tackle the worst of it!

Our heating systems are all up and running; we've tackled most of the heating complaints that come in during any season start up.

The more DDC systems we have installed coupled with new high efficiency boiler installations we will continue to see a decrease in heating calls every year. The remote access to our systems that DDC provides allows us for a better response as we can trouble shoot most issues before dispatching a technician to attend which then reduces our turnaround time on Service Requests.

All the District fields are now closed for the winter season. An email has been sent out containing a Memo explaining that fields are not to be used during the winter period as use can create damage to the fields. We hope most schools follow these instructions so we can minimize repairs in the Spring.

TRANSPORTATION AND FLEET

We are in the process of implementing our web based vehicle inspections. The program has been rolled out to the Audio/Visual team as a beta test. After some minor fine tuning the system will be rolled out to the grounds department this week. The program allows our employees to perform the mandatory vehicle inspections using the web application as opposed to inspection books.

Two new manuals are almost ready for distribution; the School District 61 specific National Safety Code (NSC Safety Plan) and the School District 61 Bus Driver Reference Manual will be ready for the new year.

OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT

The Operation Department completed the construction clean up and restorations of the floors after the construction was completed at Artemis Place for the Lansdowne School grade 6 classes.

The Operations Department has implemented a computerized tracking system for calling out Spare board Custodians in the event a permanent full time Custodian calls in sick or off on Medical leave.

As of November 1st all schools have been supplies with the free Feminine Hygiene product as mandated by the Provincial Government.

OAK BAY ARTIFICIAL TURF

We finally have the product we ordered to properly secure the artificial turf field from spreading the loose plastic grass beyond the field. The material shown in the photo is 4' high and secured along the bottom with 2x4 lumber and anchored in place. We will still stop by





weekly and after heavy winds to make sure it remains in good condition and string has not escaped.

FIRE SAFETY AT CHRISTMAS

A message from Facilities has gone out about fire safety in the schools during the Christmas season. It is not uncommon to find paper decorations on doors and windows and elsewhere, covered with Christmas lights. This is a huge fire hazard so we are just reminding schools to be careful and think beyond the decorations and be cognizant of fire safety.
