F. FACILITIES PLANNING

F1. Reynolds Garden Project

Aaron Norris, Secondary Vice-Principal of Reynolds High School, introduced Leah Seltzer, LifeCycles Program Manager and Chris Hildreth, TOPSOIL Founder & CEO, along with seven students from Reynolds High School. The group provided an overview of the 9 week program "Seed the City" in which they participated during the summer/fall of 2019. Students highlighted the many positive impacts the program has had on each student. A key highlight was the recent award of a \$270,000 grant from the Vancouver Foundation to LifeCycles Program and TOPSOIL, which will help scale the project, providing core funding to the program for the next 3 years. Questions of clarification were asked.

F2. Facilities Plan Ad-Hoc Committee

Trustee Hentze, provided Trustees with an update relative to the next iteration of the Long Term Facilities Plan by way of the Board of Education's Long Term Facilities Plan Ad-Hoc Committee. Secretary-Treasurer Morris presented a revised copy of the Long Term Facilities Plan Ad-Hoc Committee's Terms of Reference for consideration. Suggested amendments were received. Staff to research the Board's past resolution relative to posting of ad hoc committee minutes, and modify the procedural notes in the Terms of Reference as required to match.

The intent of this memo is to provide the Board with an update on environmental and climate action plans and initiatives in our School District. We intend to provide the Board with a series of monthly reports on initiatives in our Schools and across the District.

These initiatives take place at a variety of levels from District and Municipal to Classroom and School Based projects. Presentations will include updates on current and future directions on Carbon and Energy Reduction, Community and Municipal Partnerships, Print Reduction, Green Career Pathway programs, Educational Initiatives, Waste Reduction, School Garden projects, School Recycling projects, Greening of school properties including planting trees and Bicycle projects.



One Planet Saanich

One Planet Saanich initiative is part of a new global Bioregional initiated 'One Planet Cities' project, funded by the KR Foundation, focused on four cities -Saanich (Canada), Elsinore (Denmark), Oxfordshire (UK), and Durban (South Africa). The leads in other cities are:

- **Oxfordshire, UK:** Oxfordshire County Council was the first local authority to sign up, and is working alongside Bioregional Oxfordshire.
- **Durban, South Africa:** Bioregional South Africa is collaborating with a citizen-led coalition in the city to bring together local partners.
- Elsinore, Denmark: This municipality in Denmark is supported by The Ecological Council.









- Waste/Consumables is a much lower component of the Territorial inventory





46% (by number of items) of all the garbage we collected over the year was from Tim Hortons which is even more than "personal garbage" which was either garbage from your lunch or Thrifty's basically anything without commercial branding.



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Conclusion

Our Hypothesis was correct.

Therefore we need to reduce our consumption of our single use containers etc.

Some ways you can reduce single used plastic is spending about \$10-20 to buy a reusable straw and cup from Amazon, Tim Hortons, Starbucks, Dollarama and some others. This is just one little thing you can do to make a big difference.





Further things we discovered...

We often think we are recycling but it is really going into the garbage :-(

Soft plastics -- we have a recycle bin for these but they apparently are not being recycled by the district right now :-(

Same with Styrofoam and foil-lined plastics :-(

If things aren't perfectly clean and sorted they go in the garbage too.... But we aren't told :-(

We need transparent discussion within our district to be able to do better...



RE: MOE Updated Operating Grant

On December 18, 2019, the Ministry of Education (MOE) updated operating grant funding based on actual student enrolment as at September 30, 2019.

The District's preliminary budget for 2019-2020 includes operating grant funding based on projected student enrolment of 19,562.478 FTE. The actual student count for September was confirmed at 19,647.723 FTE, 85.245 FTE higher than projected. Total enrolment based funding, with the addition of Home School students and Course Challenges, increased by \$638,749.

Funding for Unique Student Needs, which includes English Language Learning (ELL), Aboriginal Education, Special Education and Adult Education, increased by \$154,705 over projections. The Supplement for Salary Differential, which provides additional funding to districts with higher average teacher salaries, increased by \$219,179.

Operating grant funding tied to the September 2019 enrolment count increased by \$1,012,533 over what was projected in the preliminary budget. Funding tied to the July 2019 enrolment count increased by \$21,500.

The overall increase in operating grant funding of \$1,034,033, along with associated cost increases, will be reflected in the final budget to be presented to the Board in February.

Update for December2019 Capital Projects, Operations, Transportation & Planning

Networks, Communication and Security Systems

During the month of December we are looking to complete close to 220 Service Requests. Some of the highlights of the month include laying out the Print Zone project for Reynolds and Lambrick Park.

Finalizing the design for the Library projection systems for Lambrick Park and Mount Doug, Lambrick Park is now underway.

Minor network expansion projects were completed in 6 differ schools as well. Quadra, Lake Hill and Torquay had all of their Tec Packages serviced and realigned this month. New or upgraded projection systems were completed in Central, Cedar Hill, Gordon Head, Monterey, Lambrick and James Bay. The Security/Access Control System team has laid out the plan for Rogers and Reynolds and we will be reviewing those plans shortly. We have also started the preparation for the Doncaster Before and after school care facilities.

The last pour for the Tolmie building is now complete and the structure will be built in the New Year.




Completed concrete slab (floor) at Tolmie Trades Training Centre
