 - i. Partial Disposal Bylaw, 2022: 3rd Reading

Secretary-Treasurer Morris provided an overview prior to the third and final reading of the partial disposal of land located at Lansdowne Middle School South Campus. Discussion ensued amongst the Trustees with questions of clarification being asked of Secretary-Treasurer Morris.

Whereas a board of education may dispose of land or improvements owned or administered by the board under the authority of Section 96(3) of the School Act, subject to the Orders of the Minister of Education (the "Minister");

AND WHEREAS the Minister issued Order M193/08 effective September 3, 2008 (the "Order") requiring fee simple sales and leases of land or improvements for a term of ten years or more to be specifically approved by the Minister, unless the transferee is an independent school or another school board;

AND WHEREAS Section 65(5) of the School Act requires a board of education to exercise a power with respect to the acquisition or disposal of property only by bylaw;

AND WHEREAS:

- A. The Board of Education of School District No. 61 (Greater Victoria) (the "Board") owns lands and improvements at 2780 Richmond Road, Victoria, B.C. known as Lansdowne Middle School, South Campus (formerly Richmond Elementary School site (the "Property");
- B. The Facility Number of the Property is:105629.
- C. The legal description of the Property is: Parcel Identifier: 005-170-222 Lot 3, Section 26, Victoria District, Plan 10792;
- D. The Board proposes to subdivide and sell to the Victoria Hospice Society (the "VHS") the portion of the Property lying to the west and south of Bowker Creek and measuring approximately 1.9 acres in area as shown on Schedule A attached hereto (the "Lands"), pursuant to the terms of a conditional agreement of

purchase and sale (the "Sale Agreement") for a price of \$2,500,000, adjusted as provided in the Sale Agreement (the "Price");

- E. The Board is satisfied that it would be in the best interests of the Board to enter into the Sale Agreement and pursuant to its obligations thereunder subdivide the Property and sell the Lands to the VHS for the Price (the "Subdivision and Sale");
- F. The Board is satisfied that the Subdivision and Sale will not interfere with the use by the Board of the remainder of the Property for educational purposes.

NOW THEREFORE be it enacted as a Bylaw of the Board that the Sale Agreement and the Subdivision and Sale be and are hereby authorized, ratified and approved, subject to the Minister of Education providing a written Certificate of Disposal approving the sale of the Lands.

BE IT FURTHER enacted that the Secretary-Treasurer be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the Board to execute and deliver the Sale Agreement and, subject to the Minister's Approval, all documents required to complete the Subdivision and Sale, and all related and ancillary documents, with all such amendments thereto as the Secretary-Treasurer may, in her discretion, consider advisable.

This Bylaw may be cited as "School District No. 61 (Greater Victoria) Lansdowne Middle School, South Campus (formerly Richmond Elementary School) Site Partial Disposal Bylaw 2022".

F. QUESTION PERIOD

- **Q:** In cases where the Board is no longer comprised of the required number of active Trustees set out in *Section 30* of the *School Act* and is therefore no longer able to act as a whole, where does the Board derive its authority? Can the Board Chair please explain why a Board's ability to act as whole does not depend on the ability of each of its trustees to exercise their core statutory duties as elected trustees (including but not limited to attendance and participation in public meetings of the board)? In this explanation, please provide the specific section(s) of legislation or Board policy that specify the circumstances in which a quorum of a board has an inherent or implied power to remove or suspend trustees by a majority vote.
- A: In cases where the Board is no longer comprised of the required number of active Trustees set out in *Section 30* of the *School Act* and is therefore no longer able to act as a whole, where does the Board derive its authority? Can the Board Chair please explain why a Board's ability to act as whole does not depend on the ability of each of its trustees to exercise their core statutory duties as elected trustees (including but not limited to attendance and participation in public meetings of the board)? In this explanation, please provide the specific section(s) of legislation or Board policy that specify the circumstances in which a quorum of a board has an inherent or implied power to remove or suspend trustees by a majority vote.
- **Q:** How is it that you can vote on this bylaw tonight when we know that the Victoria Hospice Society proposal has changed from the original proposal on which this bylaw is based? The latest proposal encompasses only 1.3 acres and has changed significantly in fact it has changed twice since the original agreement signed on Sept. 27, 2021. This bylaw concerns an agreement on a plan that no longer exists. How can you legitimately vote on this? What parcel of land are you actually selling if you vote yes? 1.9 acres? 1.3 acres?

A: The purchase and sale agreement and bylaw are consistent with what is now proposed because they both describe the parcel to be created by subdivision and sold as the land "lying to the west and south of Bowker Creek", which was estimated in the agreement to be "approximately 1.9 acres". The parties have agreed that the lot boundary for the area to be sold would be along the top of the southwest bank of Bowker Creek, which would result in a parcel 1.28 acres in area, without any change to the purchase price. The approximation of area in the agreement was inaccurate, apparently because it was based on a measurement from the midpoint of the creek, despite the wording in the agreement. The parties have also agreed to widen Bowker Creek and change its alignment slightly, but those minor changes to the Creek should not invalidate the description of the land to be sold that appears in the agreement and the bylaw.

Dear Premier Horgan, Minister Whiteside and Minister Robinson:

RE: STUDENT SERVICES FUNDING IN SCHOOL DISTRICT 5 (SOUTHEAST KOOTENAY)

School District 5 (Southeast Kootenay) notes that there are several services that are required to be provided for <u>all students</u> in addition to their education in a regular classroom. These services include things such as access to counselling, occupational therapy, physiotherapy, school psychology, and speech-language therapy. In addition to these services, students with special needs require case management by student services teachers, supports by education assistants, and youth care workers. Our Indigenous population is also served by our Aboriginal Education Support workers.

The current Ministry of Education funding model is insufficient to provide for the varying needs of our diverse and different ability students in School District 5 (Southeast Kootenay). We are provided with targeted level 1, 2, 3 funding for special education (high cost/low incidence) but this is insufficient to meet the needs of all students and classrooms. We are also aware that some funding sources were moved out of the high incidence/low funding categories to the Basic Allocation with deregulation of funding in 2003. The needs of all students in our district have significantly outpaced the funding provided.

In province-wide research, the BC Teacher's Federation indicates "only 65.35% of the actual special education operating expenses were covered by special education operating grant funds" in 2019/2020.

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In 2019/2020, our district received \$8,182,750 in targeted special education funding and expended \$13,396,202. Therefore, <u>only 61.1% of the actual special education operating</u> <u>expenses were covered by targeted special education operating grant funds</u>.

In 2020/2021, our district received \$9,679,230 in targeted special education funding and expended \$16,006,348. Therefore, <u>only 60.5% of the actual special education operating</u> expenses were covered by special education operating grant funds.

We also wanted to bring your attention to the following 2021 facts about our district:

- The number of students being claimed in Level 1 and 2 are the <u>highest</u> they have historically been, totalling 343.
 - Category A = 12
 - The funding provided does not cover the cost of a 1-1 education assistant for these physically dependent students.
 - Category G = 205
 - A high percentage of these students need significantly more support than is provided with current funding.
- The number of students being claimed in Level 3, Category H are the <u>highest</u> they have historically been, totalling 215.
 - Approximately 57% of these students require support through most of the school day and all have connections to additional services in our communities.
 - Our district has always been viewed under a microscope over the number of students we have in Category H according to provincial standards.
 - It's becoming more common to make sure that we have enough support staff in schools that understand how to work with students while coping through trauma. The community services that used to support these students are only serving students who have a life-threatening mental illness.
 - Mental illness is becoming the next crisis, caused by financial and social strain. Targeted grant funding for mental health is \$50,000 annually. For 2021/22 \$74,000 more was provided. This has not been identified in the funding for 2022/2023.
- The number of students not in level 1, 2, 3, and whom have diverse learning needs and different abilities are the **highest** they have historically been.
- We have not been able to provide learning assistance to students who require a minor amount of support to make a difference in their educational journey.

Approximately 15.4% of the School District 5 (Southeast Kootenay) student population (899/5836) require additional support to meet their needs and graduate with dignity and purpose. Our district requests that the Ministry of Education adequately fund all our students

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and schools. Targeted funding for all students with needs would work best for our District.

More support services funding is required to properly consider the needed support and to increase the Southeast Kootenay School District 89% graduation completion rates. We can not ignore the remaining 11%. Lastly, adequate funding is the moral and ethical thing to do.

We look forward to hearing your collective responses.

AP 212 – Options for the Dissection of Animals

Background

One instructional strategy implemented as a means for students to meet the learning outcomes around animal systems is animal dissection. The district acknowledges the right of students to choose not to participate in or observe animal dissections for cultural, religious or ethical reasons.

Procedures

- 1. Schools will provide, within the resources available to them, alternative strategies and activities which meet the science curriculum learning outcomes.
- 2. In any class where animal dissection is part of the curriculum, teachers will inform students that they have a choice to opt out of animal dissection and that an alternative activity will be made available.
- 3. Students who choose to opt out of animal dissection will require a parent/guardian signature prior to commencement of a dissection activity.
- 4. Information about this option will be provided at the beginning of each course during which the dissection is scheduled and just prior to the dissection. Information will also be included in all course outlines where animal dissection is included as a part of the curricular program.
- 5. An alternative activity (not just observing) that meets the curricular learning outcomes must be provided, and must offer an equal learning experience.
- 6. All student assessments will be based on the science curriculum outcomes. For students who choose an alternative activity, assessment of their progress will be similar to assessment processes used for dissection activities.
- 7. Alternatives to animal dissection will be available in all schools, and the principal is responsible for ensuring that comparable alternatives including books, models, film, computer simulations and/or interactive CD's are available for use.

ANIMAL DISSECTION - STUDENT OPTIONS

Background

The Ministry of Education Science curriculum outlines a number of learning outcomes requiring students to learn about animal systems. These are present in several courses including Science 8, Science 9, Biology 11 and Biology 12. In particular, the Biology 11 course has a strong animal systems component and may use dissection as a common instructional strategy. Students and their parents/guardians should consider this when selecting senior science course(s).

This administrative procedure recognizes that the Science curriculum addresses topics in which dissection may be used as a teaching tool, and which may be sensitive for some students. The School District acknowledges that students, with parent/guardian consent, can choose not to participate in, or observe animal dissections for cultural, religious or ethical reasons.

Procedures

- 1. In any class or course where animal dissection is part of the curricular program, schools will accommodate students who choose not to participate in animal dissection.
 - 1.1. Students who choose not to participate in animal dissection will require written parent/guardian permission prior to commencement of the dissection activity.
 - 1.2. An alternative instructional activity will be made available for the student.
 - 1.3. This activity must meet the curricular learning outcomes and offer a similar learning experience.
 - 1.4. The activity may include computer simulations, paper exercises, personal research, or other activity as determined by the classroom teacher.
 - 1.5. The time and effort required is to be similar to that provided through regular classroom instruction.
 - 1.6. For students who choose an alternative activity, assessment of their progress will be similar to the assessment processes used for dissection activities.
- 2. Information about an alternative delivery option to animal dissection will be in the course outline as well as discussed in class just prior to the dissection.

We are addressing this letter to both our provincial and federal levels of government as we feel the climate crisis depends on cooperation and collaboration from all administrations. The effects of the climate crisis will fall on the already overburdened shoulders of our younger generation. School districts will need any resources available to help students grow and adapt in a proactive environment.

At its recent Regular Board Meeting of February 22, 2022, the Board of Education of School District 69 (Qualicum) passed the following motion:

THAT the Board of Education of School District 69 (Qualicum) SD69 write letters to provincial and federal bodies reminding them of their commitments to climate action and requesting that resources be made available to help move all school districts in BC to zero carbon facilities. Though targets at both levels of government are to be in place by 2050, the letter would request an expedited process and a target of much sooner than 2050. The federal-provincial Pan Canadian Framework on Clean Growth Climate Change (PCF) calls for all new buildings to be Net-Zero Energy Ready (NZEr) by 2030. This concept could be expanded to include all buildings.

Though both our federal and provincial governments have set targets for climate reduction by 2050, the recently released Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change report is a glaring condemnation of our collective lack of action. U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said, "As climate impacts worsen – and they will – scaling up investments will be essential for survival...

Continuing on this theme he remarked "Unchecked carbon pollution is forcing the world's most vulnerable on a frog march to destruction," "The facts are undeniable. This abdication of leadership is criminal."

The Pan-Canadian Framework on Clean Growth and Climate Change has called for all new buildings to be net-zero ready by 2030. As climate change is happening even faster than science originally calculated, it is essential that all levels of government invest in, not only new buildings, but help existing infrastructure to be net zero ready by 2030. The framework states, "The cost of inaction is greater than the cost of action" and "recognizing the commitment of the federal government to work with provinces and territories to complement and support their actions without duplicating them, including by promoting innovation and enabling clean growth across all sectors and "Clean growth opportunities will benefit all sectors and regions."

Provincially, the Minister of Education's Mandate Letter also states that she will make progress to "Continue to invest in new and modernized schools, including focusing on meeting seismic requirements and climate change and energy efficiency standards as set out in our CleanBC plan."

Our school district is presently pursuing a net-zero carbon site in our district and hopes all our sites to be net-zero ready by 2030. These are the sites of our future innovators and creators who will move us to a cleaner future. This will require resources and commitments from our provincial and federal partners. It will require deliberate dedication to ensure all school districts have the means to help reach the aggressive goals to be carbon-zero ready by 2030, in all our buildings.

We are asking our federal and provincial jurisdictions to keep us informed and advised on programs and financial opportunities that we can access to move our goals forward. We are asking that you reach out to us to see how you can help us achieve net-zero ready goals in all our buildings by 2030.

As educators we are adept at meeting the challenges of local and global critical circumstances. We are foundational to the success of meeting the global climate crisis through our youth. We just need the right supports, now rather than later.

RE: Letter dated March 9, 2022 (the "Letter") to the Minister of Education (the "Minister") from Mulroney Siver Law, solicitors for the Friends of Vic High ("FVH"} regarding the granting by The Board of Education of School District No. 61 (Greater Victoria) (the "Board") of a Statutory Right of Way (the "Greenway SRW") over a portion of the Victoria High School site

The Board is in receipt of a copy of the above mentioned Letter. The Board refutes the allegation in the Letter that the granting of the SRW to the City of Victoria at the Victoria High School site is a *de facto* disposition in fee simple.

The Status of the Greenway SRW

The Letter incorrectly states that the Board has not formally approved the Greenway SRW. The Greenway SRW was approved by three readings of a Board bylaw on June 24, 2021 and was registered on October 15, 2021 under registration number CA9436387. A copy of the fully executed Greenway SRW is enclosed with this letter.





The Area Affected by the Greenway SRW

The area encumbered by the Greenway SRW is shown on Plan EPP103223, a copy of which is attached as the last page of the Greenway SRW. A copy of Plan EPP103223 was also attached as Exhibit 3 to the Approval Bylaw when it received three readings. We also enclose a copy of a color-coded diagram showing the ownership of the parcels encumbered by the Greenway SRW. The City of Victoria (the "**City**") is the registered owner of most of the encumbered parcels. The narrow strip of land owned by the Board that runs from Gladstone Avenue to Vining Street is between four feet four inches and five feet three inches wide. That land could not be built on by the Board due to applicable set back requirements.

Requirements for Consultation and Ministry Approval

There is no requirement in the British Columbia *School Act*, the orders of the Minister or the Board's land disposal regulations, policies and procedures for public consultation or the Minister's approval prior to the granting of a statutory right of way.

However, the Letter alleges that the Greenway SRW is actually a fee simple transfer that requires consultation and Ministry approval, because the Greenway SRW grants possession or control of the land to an extent inconsistent with the ownership rights of the Board.

The Terms of the Greenway SRW

The Greenway SRW does not grant possession or control of the land to an extent inconsistent with the ownership rights of the Board. Section 5.2 of the Greenway SRW reads as follows:

5.2 No part of the fee simple to the Lands of an Owner shall pass to or be vested in the City under or by virtue of this Agreement, and each Owner may fully use and enjoy all the Lands of such Owner subject only to the rights and restrictions in this Agreement.

The Greenway SRW was granted to the City so the City can access and maintain a public pedestrian greenway that is to be constructed by Capital Regional Housing Corporation.



Legal Cases Referred to in the Letter

The Letter refers to several court cases. Each of the cases involved a private easement that was held to be invalid on principles that do not apply to the Greenway SRW. A right of way is a form of easement, but it benefits the public, and not just one owner.

In each of the cases cited in the Letter, there were rights granted by one or more owners to a single neighbouring owner for gardening or cultivating crops, activities that necessarily involve the exclusion of all others, including the grantor. A public right of way does not exclude continued use by the grantor. By its very nature, a public right of way meets the legal requirement that an easement provide for a non-exclusive right of use.

Furthermore, each of the cited cases resulted in a finding that the easement was invalid, not that it amounted to a fee simple transfer.

The Greenway SRW is a valid easement and does not constitute a fee simple transfer. Accordingly, public consultation and approval of the Minister was not required prior to the Board granting the Greenway SRW.

Dear Trustees Painter, Ferris, Leonard, Watters, Hentze, Whiteaker, and Duncan,

I am writing in response to the board's open letter to Rightsholders and Stakeholders dated February 24, 2022. I am phrasing my response in the form of my questions because I am aware that the Minister of Education's "expectation is that the board is listening to the voices of First Nations and community members, and taking steps to answer the questions they have raised about the steps that have been taken" [1]. As such, I am also copying Minister Whiteside on this letter to apprise her of some of the many remaining questions in the community regarding the recent suspension of two trustees. I also would like you to make sure the Minister is aware of your response to the questions I and other community members are asking about this process.

I am all too aware that the letter I am responding to does not represent or speak for inactive trustees, and I also understand that these trustees have been deprived of their ability to correspond with their constituents. However, it is critical that Trustees McNally and Paynter continue to be aware of public correspondence to the board, so I ask that you include this letter as an agenda item and share the letter publicly in its entirety at the earliest opportunity.

I would also like to receive Trustee Paynter's and McNally's response and their perspective on many of my questions, so I ask that you either provide both trustees with an opportunity to forward their correspondence to me, or provide them with the means to respond to the many questions members of the public have for them as individual trustees and members of the board.

I assume that the Chair's statements from his February 24th letter reflect the view of the majority remaining on this board, and I therefore expect that the view of the majority is also reflected in the board's answer to each question below:

- The Chair begins his February 24th letter by recognizing that "the authority of the school board is derived from its ability to act as a whole" but ultimately concludes by suggesting that nearly *any* number of *active* trustees on any board is sufficient for the board to act as a whole in any circumstances, so long as quorum is met [2].
 - On what legal basis does this dismembered board derive its authority to act on the behalf of members who are deprived of their basic capacity to fulfill any of the functions attached to their role as elected members of the board?
 - In the Board's view, are there any cases in which suspending multiple school trustees from attendance and participation in public meetings would illegally

deprive voters of the sufficient number of active trustees required on this board of education by the *School Act*?

- Put differently, does a quorum of five trustees possess the same authority as an entire board of education in cases where there is no legislation or case law enabling members of the board to deprive each other of their ability to carry out the duties of the board "as a whole"?
- Does the board's ability to act as a whole depend on the ability of every member of the board to act *as trustees*, or is the number of active members on a board irrelevant to the board's "ability to act as a whole"?
- What is the minimum number of votes required on a board illegally deprived of two voting members to successfully pass a motion?
- In cases where the number of active trustees on a board of education does not equal the combined total of all trustees legally entitled to membership of the board, how many votes are required to pass motions and conduct board business?
- The case referenced in the Chair's letter (*Barnett v Cariboo Regional District*, 2009 BCSC 471) suggests that a public body's "inherent power" to regulate the conduct of elected members are limited by principles of natural justice as well as relevant legislation, where applicable [<u>3</u>].
 - Does the board have an inherent power to prematurely end the term of any trustee on the board of education for any other reason other than those described in the applicable legislation (the *School Act*, in this case)?
 - Please provide the specific section(s) of legislation or board policy that specify the circumstances in which a quorum of a board has an inherent or implied power to remove or suspend trustees by a majority vote.
- Is the Board aware of any concerns or allegations of harassment against trustees other than those named in the February 24th open letter from the Chair? Specifically, how many trustees is the Chair referring to in the following statement?
 - "...concerns were raised the continued use of public forums by trustees [...] to disparage employees" (p. 4)
- According to the letter, "the Board issued a public apology to affected members of staff who were publicly criticized by trustees on social media" following an investigation in Spring 2019.
 - Is there a record of this public apology? When did it take place?
 - Where did the "public criticism" in question take place, and who brought it to the Board's attention? Is there a record of a formal complaint connected to the incidents referred to in the letter?
- In his letter, the Chair cites a March 2, 2020 resolution to "formally censure Trustee Diane McNally for her unauthorized disclosure of a confidential report, contrary to [...] Regulation #4304".

- Regulation 4304 governs the conduct of "all employees employed by the Board of Education" and provides the Superintendent with authority to ultimately adjudicate appeals [4]. Where does the regulation set out the process by which Trustee McNally was investigated and sanctioned for her behaviour?
- Did Trustee McNally identify any complainant(s) in her disclosure of the report in question? In the event that this disclosure did not jeopardize the confidentiality of district staff, in what way was McNally's disclosure of a confidential report "contrary to Regulation #4304"?
- Although the date on which the Board previously voted to formally censure Trustee Diane McNally is disclosed in the letter, the Chair does not substantiate his claim of the other "multiple previous attempts to educate, correct, and address the concerning conduct" of any other trustee.
 - What "concerning conduct" is the Chair referring to in this statement? Please provide detail history of misconduct for <u>all</u> currently sanctioned trustees prior to the date at which the board became aware of the present case (May 2021).
- Similarly, although the Chair alleges that the former Superintendent ended her employment with the district as a result of unspecified public comments disparaging her performance, there does not seem to be a formal record of such a complaint.
 - Did McNeil substantiate the former Superintendent's concerns regarding alleged inappropriate comments made by trustees in public meetings or social media?
 - What "statements impugning [the Superintendent's] competence and integrity
 [...] in public meetings of the board" is the board referring to in their October
 2021 letter of apology to the Superintendent? Since the conduct in question is not confidential, there is no reason to withhold the specific details of misconduct referenced in the letter from the public.
- The Chair provides the date at which "a complaint was brought forward by the Secretary Treasurer" but the circumstances under which the board recognizes and adjudicates such complaints are entirely mysterious and unexplained in the letter.
 - What constitutes "a complaint" against trustees of the Greater Victoria School District Board of Education?
 - Has the board ever responded to a complaint against trustees from members of the public or partner groups, or do they only acknowledge correspondence from school district staff as "a complaint"?
 - What board bylaw, regulation, or policy sets out the criteria and accompanying process, if any, under which a board is required to investigate and oversee complaints against members of the board (rather than board employees)?
- McNeil observed in her investigation that "the majority of inappropriate comments occurred not in public meetings" and yet the Chair alleged in his letter that "so much of the conduct in issue took place in public, during the performance of public duties" (p. 2).

- What examples of misconduct is the Chair referring to in the statement? As noted in his letter, since the conduct in question is not confidential, there is no reason to withhold the specific details of misconduct referenced in the letter from the public.
- McNeil' statements also suggest that her report may not have taken into account the extent to which trustees communicated their concerns directly to staff, and indeed, in at least one case, the report seems incomplete in the sense that McNeil "was not aware of whether the trustee made any further effort to correct [an] earlier misstatement" (p. 4). This is a genuinely astonishing observation in the context of a purported "fair process" or investigation into complaints of bullying and harassment against any trustee as set out by the principles alluded to in Justice McKinnon's 2009 decision in *Barnett vs Cariboo Regional District*. Instead, McNeil's admission—or rather, omission— of insufficient details relating to the complaint(s) raises a number of pressing questions:
 - Did McNeil's investigation include interviews with both the complainants and the trustees accused of misconduct?
 - Did either complainant named in McNeil's report make an effort to "address their concern with" the trustees in question, and provide them with "an opportunity to respond"? If so, how did the trustees respond?
 - Were the trustees accused of misconduct (including Trustees Paynter and McNally) provided an opportunity to respond to the substance of either complaint from staff either verbally or in writing before the conclusion of the report?
 - Were Trustees McNally and Paynter (among any other trustees named in the complaints) aware of <u>all</u> complaints brought against them prior to the conclusion of McNeil's investigation?
 - Did either Trustee McNally or Trustee Paynter make any effort to address or resolve the complaints and apologize to the complainants after they became aware of the complaint?
- Further to the above, the Chair continued his letter by claiming that both Trustee McNally and Trustee Paynter were "provided with an un-redacted copy of Mrs. McNeil's report and given an opportunity to respond to it and speak to the proposed sanction before the Board's decision was made". Unbelievably, according to this statement, it appears that Trustee McNally and Paynter were unable to speak to the investigator or address complaints against them until the Board <u>had already proposed the specific sanction they were to decide upon</u>!
 - On what date were Trustees McNally and Paynter "provided with an un-redacted copy of McNeil's report"?
 - Did McNeil's report recommend or propose a specific sanction, and were all such recommendations or proposed sanctions included in the report provided to Trustees McNally and Paynter?
 - On what date were Trustees McNally and Paynter provided with an opportunity to respond to the report and speak to the proposed sanction(s) in question?

- Did Trustees McNally and Paynter in fact accept this opportunity, and if so, on what date did they respond to the report and speak to the proposed sanction(s)?
- What other correspondence or response from the accused trustees did the rest of the board consider before reaching the decision to sanction each trustee?
- Did the sanction initially proposed or considered against Trustees McNally and Paynter differ in substance from the decision the Board eventually reached?
- Finally, in what is perhaps the most inexplicable statement in his letter, the Chair claims to have had "little choice other than to exercise its inherent powers to deprive the suspended trustees, to the fullest extent possible" of what essentially amounts to their capacity to act as trustees. Nonetheless, the Chair neglects to specify the "fullest extent" of the disciplinary action that is in fact possible in this case.
 - In the event that it is <u>not</u> possible for a majority of the board to end the term of any trustee nor prevent them from exercising their core statutory duties as trustees, what other methods of sanctioning trustees for misconduct are available to the board?
 - Before deciding to deprive Trustees McNally and Paynter of their capacity to act as trustees, did the trustees voting to suspend both Trustees McNally and Paynter consider any other choice or pursue alternative mechanisms to address each trustees misconduct? Why was every other possible choice considered insufficient, inadequate, or disproportionate to the alleged misconduct?

As suggested above, the Chair's February 24th open letter to Rightsholders and Stakeholder invites far more questions than it has answered to date. Contrary to the Chair's initial statement on February 11th, it appears that the resolution to "censure" two trustees has in fact exceeded the board's authority to misconduct as it has prevented both trustees from "attendance and participation" in all meetings of the board as described by applicable legislation. Crucially, given that applicable legislation clearly describes a process by which trustees may be disqualified or removed from the board [5], *Barnett v Cariboo Regional District*, 2009 BCSC 471 does not provide the legal precedent required under case law to expel two trustees from *all* their duties as board members throughout the remainder of their elected term.

Furthermore, rather than describing the process by which "a thorough investigation and subsequent report substantiated the claims of misconduct", it appears that the board's investigation of trustees did not in fact apply the principles of natural justice required by case law. Instead, I am left with concerns that the board did not:

- Provide each trustee with adequate notice of each complaint against them
- Allow each trustee to speak with the investigator directly in her attempts to substantiate accusations against them
- Consider and address the response of each trustee prior to concluding the investigation and considering an appropriate outcome
- Honour each trustees' right to a fair and unbiased hearing

Until or unless the board releases the McNeil report in full and overturns the illegal suspension of two of its members, I anticipate answers to all of my questions regarding your attempts to silence and remove elected members from the Board of Education.

Re: Lansdowne South Land Disposal

I am writing on behalf of the Greater Victoria Teachers' Association (GVTA) to urge you to reject the Greater Victoria School District's sale of the 1.28 acres adjacent to the Lansdowne South Campus to the Victoria Hospice Society. Using land sales to fund necessary building upgrades is short-sighted and suggesting that this will advance the Board's climate action plan is shameful.

This land is not surplus to the needs of the School District and is required for educational purposes. Schools in the Greater Victoria School District are at capacity. This land not only serves an educational purpose as a green space but could be a potential site for a much-needed new elementary school. With the integration of Early Childhood Education into the purview of the Ministry of Education, the Greater Victoria School District also needs to consider sites for childcare centers.

The Board was required to engage in broad consultation, and this has not been done, nor has the position of the community, stakeholders, and rightsholders been acknowledged. The community opposes this land sale. Both VCPAC and the GVTA spoke against the sale before boycotting future meetings because of the dysfunction of this Board. It should also be noted that this sale was approved by a four to three vote while two publicly elected trustees are perhaps unlawfully suspended. If those trustees had been present, the GVTA has every confidence the vote to dispose of this land would have failed.

We urge you to stop this sale.

RE: Request for meetings to be held in hybrid mode

Thank you for sharing your thoughts regarding your board's vision for events hosted by the British Columbia School Trustees Association (BCSTA). As you are well aware, BCSTA's actions are driven by member feedback and needs. Your concerns resonate with the association's recent work. We have just enacted a Climate Action Working Group, and the board has recently put in work evaluating the association's carbon footprint. BCSTA also remains at the forefront of provincial conversations regarding COVID-19. These are concerns that touch us all at provincial and local levels.

While we successfully hosted our 2021 AGM online, it came at the cost of lost connections and an inability to share authentically and freely with one another. Time spent travelling is an investment of resources and time, and our board firmly believes that the benefits garnered from attending our annual general meeting pay dividends in districts across the province. Our AGM provides members many opportunities outside of the official program to share, collaborate and find support within the membership. These connections and pathways are simply impossible to emulate in a virtual setting. Time spent travelling is always a concern, but as trustees, we have committed ourselves to many tasks that require investment to see through. It is not lost on the board of directors that our province is vast, and travel can be difficult for rural communities. We keep this in mind when locating our gatherings in Vancouver to limit extra transfers and connections when travelling. We sincerely appreciate the commitment trustees from rural and remote communities have when attending our events, and we value their presence and perspectives.

These actions require an investment, but they lead us to connect with our peers in ways we cannot accomplish in a virtual setting. An example of this can be seen in our current AGM program. We are thrilled to be devoting an entire day to Indigenous learning at this year's AGM, with elders from across the province converging to share wisdom and insights in ways many trustees have likely not experienced before. For many, this will be a life-changing occasion.

The impact COVID-19 has on our day-to-day lives remains, but we have learned that we have many ways in which we can meet safely and effectively. Under the guidance of the Office of the Provincial Health Officer, BCSTA staff have worked diligently to ensure that our meetings are safe for those in attendance.

Association staff are also working closely with venue operators and hotel management to adhere to safety protocols. B.C. continues to make strides forward in its re-opening strategy, but we understand that there is no one-size-fits-all solution, especially for those with increased risk. As individuals, we all have unique tolerances when considering appropriate levels of risk, and I respect these personal decisions are difficult to make. On behalf of BCSTA's board of directors, I wish to emphasise that these concerns are heard. Our decision to proceed with an in-person AGM is driven by a desire to support the association's members in the best possible way while considering 60 unique points of view.

Finding balance amongst these perspectives is challenging, and BCSTA's board of directors and staff continue to evaluate and consider our options for every event. Currently, providing virtual options requires significant resources and staff to administer and run, and our association cannot offer hybrid options for our events. Some of the considerations BCSTA has made leading to our decision to have our AGM in Vancouver include:

- Full staff engagement is required to support in-person events, and the same levels of commitment are needed to support our virtual events. Providing both options in tandem is not logistically possible with our current staffing.
- The cost of outsourcing the assistance required to run two events (in-person and virtually) is prohibitively high, leading to significantly higher registration fees if pursued.
- Contracts with speakers may limit streaming and recording options or increase related costs if added, raising registration fees.
- Hotels room blocks and gathering spaces are contracted years in advance to lock in low rates. BCSTA is subject to guarantees for room occupancy, meals, and more. Failing to meet these expectations leads to financial penalties against the association.

It remains our goal to provide our members with high-quality events that support development and opportunities to collaborate. It is the board's shared desire that all trustees attend AGM. Still, we must balance that aspiration against the program's quality, overall costs and our staff's ability to administrate the event, as our resources are limited.

Know that we plan to share materials on the BCSTA HUB where permission to do so is provided for those unable to attend. Our goal is to support those who cannot join us as best as possible. BCSTA will continue to assess the viability of virtual options during every planning cycle, and we thank you for providing feedback that will be considered during those discussions.

Dear Minister Whiteside,

I am writing to request your direct intervention in the ongoing internal dispute between trustees in School District No. 61. In particular, I call upon you to inform the public and board in School District 61 of your view on whether this province's boards of education under your leadership may vary the elected membership of the board without your consent. Until or unless you have explicitly and publicly cleared the majority of this board of wrongdoing in their attempts to prematurely end the terms of two trustees, I also ask that you take whatever means necessary to restore members Diane McNally and Rob Paynter to their elected positions on the board.

I urge you to address this request with the urgency and attention it deserves. The Greater Victoria School District Board of Education is in crisis. In the space of less than a year, staff have been accused of racist conduct, and multiple trustees have in turn been accused by staff of bullying and harassment. In this time, the leadership of the board has changed hands three times, and the most recent change in leadership has been accompanied by increasingly aggressive tactics to intimidate and silence a minority of trustees on the board. In his February 24th open letter to the community, the chair attempted to justify this cynical abuse of the board's "inherent power" to regulate "interactions between elected officials and staff" by incorrectly describing the sanctions against each trustee as a culmination of "multiple previous attempts to educate, correct, and address the concerning conflict".¹ Contrary to the statements in this letter, no such record of previous misconduct existed for all suspended trustees nor were either of the suspended trustees provided with the opportunities that they would have been entitled to under a "fair process".² For example, neither Trustee Paynter nor McNally had the opportunity to address the allegations against them during the course of the district's investigation into allegations against them nor were they given adequate opportunity to inform themselves of the recommendations of sanction resulting from that investigation once investigator Marcia McNeil had concluded her report and provided her recommendations to the board.³ More importantly, the letter neglected to explain the extent to which the board's inherent power to regulate the behaviour of its members includes the authority to expel a minority of trustees from the board.

I am not alone in these concerns. The Victoria Confederation of Parent Advisory Councils,⁴ the Greater Victoria Teachers' Association,⁵ and the Songhees Nation⁶ have objected to the attempted removal or suspension of two trustees from the board and have rejected the authority of the remaining seven trustees to effectively represent the interests of the voting public and make decisions on our behalf. Allowing a dismembered board to proceed with board business and make decisions on our behalf will negatively impact the educational welfare of students in the district. Indeed, these impacts are not merely hypothetical: in the enforced absence of trustees from the board, the board has claimed to have passed motions merely by a "majority" of quorum, when in all likelihood, the presence of an additional two trustees would fundamentally change the future of education in this district. To name just the most recent example, the board attempted an illegitimate third reading of a land disposal bylaw for property at the Lansdowne Middle School south campus. Despite opposition from the majority of the board over the course of all three bylaw readings, the district recently released a statement in which they inaccurately described their board of approving a sale of 1.28 acres of land to the Victoria Hospice Society.⁷ I am concerned that the board intends to follow this undemocratic precedent as they decide how to balance a budget that will inevitably harm students without adequate representation of all trustees and partner associations as well as First Nations at the board table.

As expressed in both Trustee Paynter's and Trustee McNally's petition to the Supreme Court, and indeed, as implied by several sections of the *School Act* itself, a public body does not have the inherent power under law to overrule the will of the electorate and remove members from elected positions.⁸ The two trustees in question, Diane McNally and Rob Paynter, were elected to serve a term of four years on the school board in 2018 by a combined total of 67,278 votes—or 30% of the 226,006 votes cast in the election. Although Paynter and McNally comprise 22% of a board of education of nine trustees, they represent the 36% of the voters who elected them to a board among seven other colleagues. Unfortunately, by failing to recognize the right of all nine trustees to attend meetings as voting members of the board, the board's response to alleged trustee misconduct has broadly overruled and disregarded not only the 67,278 constituents who voted for both Trustees Paynter and McNally, but the many more for whom they speak. A majority of a board should not have the authority to deprive the public of full representation on the board as a result of its internal disciplinary proceedings. If and when you address trustee misconduct on this board of education, I ask that the eventual sanctions for any trustees target the responsible parties directly, rather than the public who voted for and are represented collectively by all trustees on the board.

In conclusion, according to the facts set out above, the board's recent decision to suspend its own members is nothing less than an attack on the integrity of the board as a democratic institution and an inexcusable assault on the democratic process itself. I therefore ask that you make every effort to intervene in this matter without further disadvantaging our students and negatively impacting their educational welfare. In particular, I request that any outcome ultimately brings together all nine trustees to resolve their internal disputes without further financial expense to the school community, and in the interim, I demand that you restore the composition of this district's board of education at the earliest opportunity.

Finally, in the absence of your intervention, I also ask that you also respond to the following questions regarding the legal outcome of the pending judicial review submitted by Trustees Paynter and McNally:

- In the event that either Trustee McNally's or Trustee Paynter's petition for judicial review is successful during your term in office, will the Ministry of Education cover the legal expenses resulting from the Greater Victoria School District Board of Education's unlawful and unauthorized attempt to intimidate, silence, and ultimately remove these two trustees?⁹
- In the event that either Trustee McNally's or Trustee Paynter's petition for judicial review is successful during your term in office, will the Ministry of Education recognize the motions passed by the dismembered Board of Education during the illegal suspension of two trustees?
 - In particular, since Trustees McNally and Paynter had already voted against and vocally opposed the Lansdowne Middle School South Campus land sale to Victoria Hospice Society, will your Ministry recognize the majority of the board opposed to the proposed sale and uphold their decision as the will of the board, instead of the decision "approved" by a minority of trustees in the March 14th open board meeting?
- Similarly, to the extent that any of the motions passed since February 8, 2022 may be recognized as valid, what is the minimum number of votes required on a board illegally deprived of two voting members to successfully pass any one of these motions during this time?

Thank you for considering these questions; I look forward to your response.

Background:

Fortis BC is a fossil fuel corporation operating to provide natural gas and renewable natural gas to customers in the province of BC. Fortis BC provides curriculum to BC schools through its "Energy Leaders" program. This Fortis BC branded curriculum includes numerous statements minimizing the harmful impacts of natural gas on the climate and environment. The lessons also fail to discuss viable options for clean energy, instead solely focusing on natural gas, normalizing its use and falsely touting it as a clean and renewable energy source.

Rationale (Issue):

At the February 7th 2022 Education Policy and Direction Committee, meeting we received presentations about curriculum developed by Fortis BC and provided to educators for implementation in our district. We heard significant concerns about 1) the quality of the curriculum and its evident bias in favour of fossil fuels; and 2) a private for-profit corporation's industry promoting curriculum being taught in public schools.

On March 2, 2022 the B.C. committee of the Canadian Association of Physicians for the Environment (CAPE) is releasing its open letter to Minister of Education Jennifer Whiteside, backed by close to 100 health, education, student, environment and community organizations, to end fossil fuel promotion in the province's schools. This open letter is backed by the BC Teachers Federation, whose president Teri Mooring notes, "The fossil fuel industry has no place in BC classrooms, especially as we face an unprecedented climate crisis. We will continue to expect the BC government to work with teachers and invest in developing unbiased, science-based climate education resources, including training for educators to support this curriculum."

NOW THEREFORE the Board enacts as follows:

- 1. The Capital Bylaw of the Board for the 2022/23 Capital Plan as approved by the Minister, to include the supported capital project(s) specified in the letter addressed to the Secretary-Treasurer and Superintendent, dated April 25, 2022 is hereby adopted.
- 2. This Capital Bylaw may be cited as School District No. 61 (Greater Victoria) Capital Bylaw No.2022-23-CPSD61-01.
