Trustee Electoral Area Variation Proposal

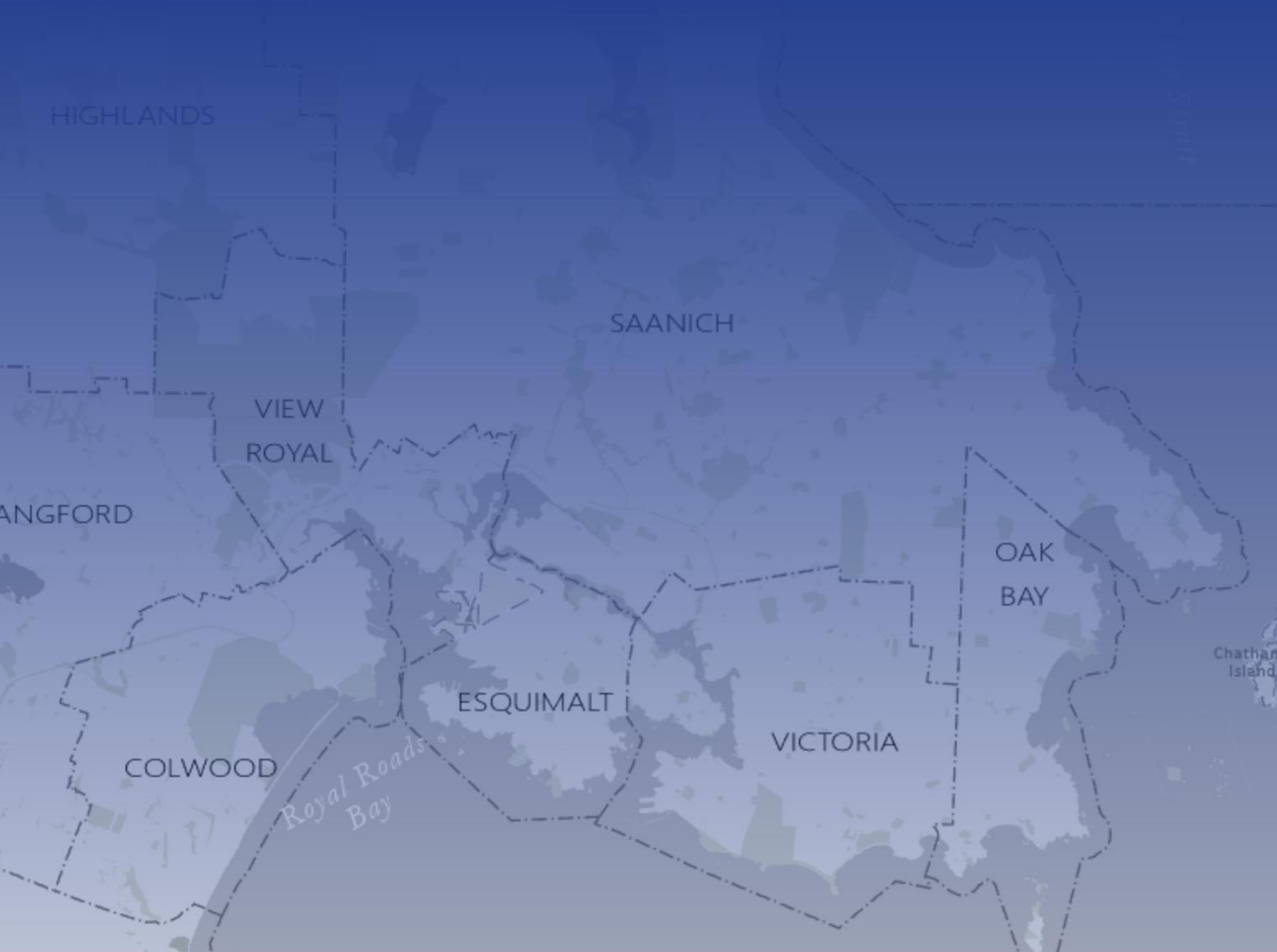


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Background Information

The Greater Victoria School District (GVSD) No. 61 is one of three school districts on lower Vancouver Island and is situated on the traditional lands of the lək̓ʷəŋən People, known today as the Esquimalt and Songhees Nations. The GVSD boundary includes the Esquimalt Nation and Songhees Nation reserves, as well as the municipalities of Esquimalt, Oak Bay, Victoria, and portions of the Highlands, Saanich, and View Royal.

On October 9, 2024, the GVSD Board of Education received a letter from the Township of Esquimalt inquiring about the consideration of multiple trustee electoral areas within the GVSD and the potential to implement such a model. The GVSD Board of Education also received a letter in support from the District of Highlands on October 22, 2024. These letters are included in the November 25, 2024 Regular Board Meeting agenda package, of which the minutes reflect a statement that the letters should be addressed to the Minister of Education and Child Care.

On March 19, 2025, both the Official Trustee and the Ministry of Education and Child Care received a letter from the Township of Esquimalt, again requesting a consideration for multiple trustee electoral areas.

The GVSD is aware of letters of support for the Township of Esquimalt's request which were expressed to the Ministry of Education and Child Care (in order between March 21, 2025 to April 28, 2025) by the Town of View Royal, Esquimalt Nation, Songhees Nation, the District of Oak Bay, and the District of Highlands.

The Official Trustee of the GVSD formed a Task Force inclusive of representatives from the GVSD; Esquimalt Nation and Songhees Nation; municipalities of Esquimalt, Highlands, Oak Bay, Saanich, Victoria, and View Royal; and the Capital Regional District (who supports in conducting elections for the two local First Nations). The Task Force met four times over four months to discuss a potential proposal for multiple trustee electoral areas within the GVSD. In addition, the Official Trustee also conducted a meeting with Esquimalt Nation and another meeting with Songhees Nation to hear their views. The collective discussions resulted in a proposed variation to the existing 'at large' electoral model, which was shared with the public through consultation and is detailed in this document.

The Task Force discussions and the proposed changes honour the GVSD's and local governments' commitment to and active participation in truth and reconciliation and the importance of working with First Nations and Rightshlders to support self-governance. This work aligns with the

Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's 94 Calls to Action, as well as the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.

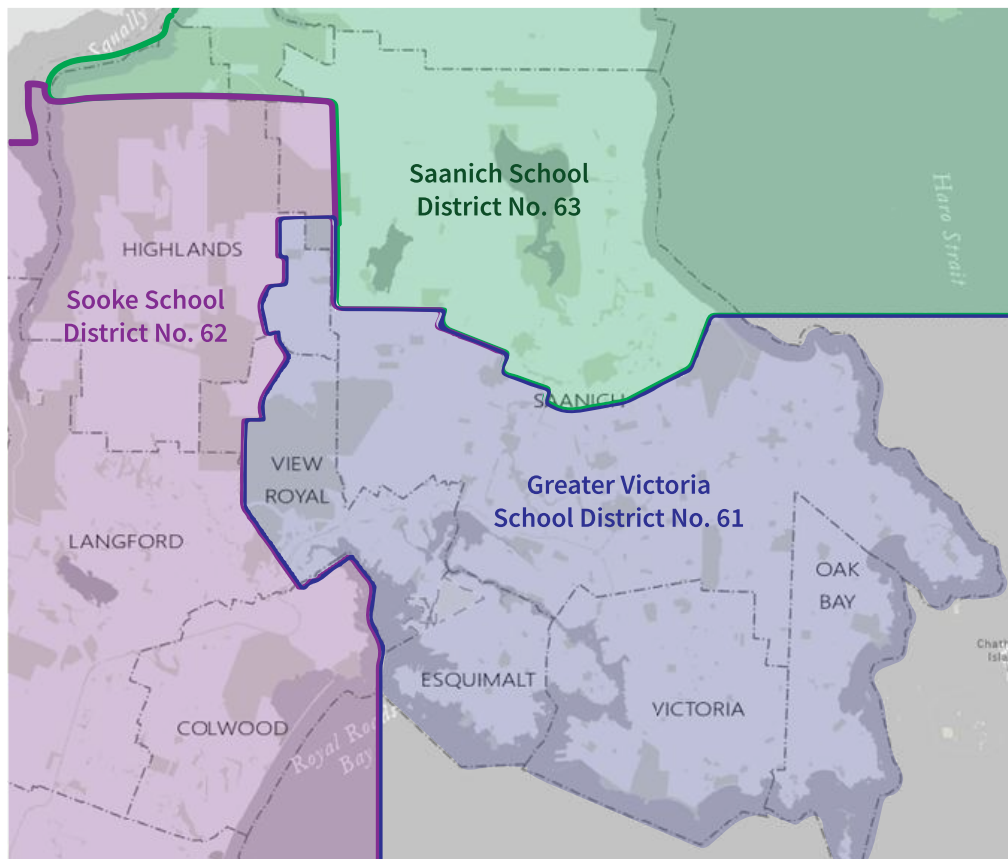
This proposal is organized in accordance with the Ministry of Education and Child Care's Trustee Variation Guidelines and contains a request that the Minister consider making a variation order pursuant to section 30 (4) of the *School Act*, prior to the next general school election to be held on October 17, 2026. A letter with this document enclosed was submitted to the Ministry of Education and Child Care on September 26, 2025.

Current Trustee Electoral Area

The GVSD currently elects nine school board trustees using an ‘at large’ model where the whole body of registered voters within GVSD boundaries vote for the election of all eligible candidates. In this model, there is only one electoral area which is equal to the GVSD boundary. Each voter in the region receives the same list of school board trustee candidates on their voter ballot.

Map

The map below shows where the current sole trustee electoral area (in blue) for GVSD lies relative to its neighbouring school districts, Sooke School District No. 62 (purple) and Saanich School District No. 63 (green).



Population

As of July 1, 2024, according to Stats Canada, there are 256,449 residents living within the GVSD boundary (the sole electoral area).

Proposed Trustee Electoral Areas

The proposed model is a shift from an ‘at large’ electoral model to one with seven trustee electoral areas. There are no proposed changes to the number of trustees, which remains at nine.

Proposed Electoral Area Names, Number of Trustees, and Population

The names of all seven proposed electoral areas and the number of trustees proposed to represent each area are listed in the table below. Proposed electoral areas are largely based on existing municipal and First Nations reserve boundaries, save for the portions of View Royal and Highlands which are to be combined to form one electoral area.

The populations of each proposed electoral area are also listed in the table below. Please note that the populations for View Royal, Highlands, and Saanich only refer to the population living within the portions of those municipalities that lie within the GVSD boundary. It is important to note that the population data in the table is based on home addresses of residents living in that area and, specifically in reference to the populations of the First Nations reserves, do not reflect the number of band members or people with Indigenous status.

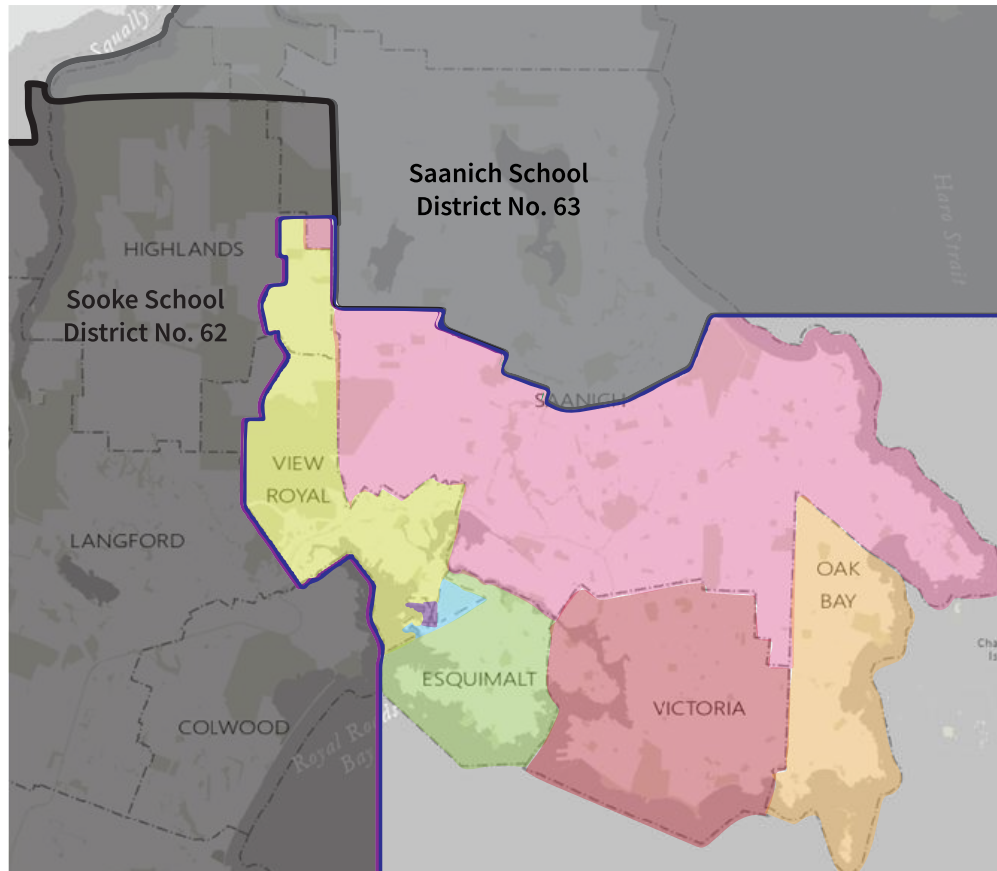

Metes and Bounds

The Greater Victoria School District has contracted a professional land surveyor to satisfy the requirement of including a “metes and bounds description of each area prepared or approved by a certified professional surveyor” within this proposal.

Rationale

The rationale for the changes requested can be summarized into four themes.

Truth and Reconciliation

As a school district, we recognize the importance of redressing the legacy of residential schools and doing so with care, patience, and with a good heart. It is crucial that we restore the relationships with those who have taken care of these lands since time immemorial.

There are three documents that are instruments of reconciliation that should be considered together:

- **10 Principles of Reconciliation:** a guide to assist in repairing the damaged relationship between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in Canada.
- **United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP):** a framework for the establishment and maintenance of mutually respectful relationships. Of note is Article 4 which sets the standard of achievement that Indigenous peoples “have the right to autonomy or self-government in matters relating to their internal and local affairs.”
- **Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada Calls to Action:** actions to mobilize levels of government, organizations, and individuals to make concrete changes in society and redress the legacy of residential schools. Calls to Action 62 through to 65 (Education for Reconciliation) are particularly relevant.

As we work together to address truth and reconciliation as a school district, and with local government partners, we aim to prioritize and uplift the voices of local First Nations. All members of the Task Force were in support of allocating two electoral areas to equal the boundaries of each of the Esquimalt First Nation and Songhees First Nation reserves.

During Task Force meetings, both Esquimalt Nation and Songhees Nation requested to be able to appoint a trustee within each of their electoral areas. The existing *School Act* does not allow for the appointment of trustees from First Nations (or other groups/individuals) and a change to the *School Act* would not be feasible in time for the 2026 election. Looking forward, the GVSD is committed to working with local First Nations and the Ministry of Education and Child Care to address the First Nations’ request to allow each of their Chief and Council to appoint a school trustee.

Localized Representation

The current ‘at large’ electoral model can create disproportionate representation of communities on the Board of Education. The table below summarizes from which municipality or First Nation each candidate and each elected trustee have resided (based on home address disclosed in their nomination package) during the past three elections. It is possible that adopting a model with multiple electoral areas can allow for more localized and inclusive representation, as voter ballots would list only the candidates running in a particular electoral area, and thus there being a greater chance of familiarity of candidates amongst voters.

Proven Model

There are 60 public school districts in British Columbia (including School District No. 93 (Conseil scolaire francophone de la C.-B.)), of which 43 use an electoral model with multiple electoral areas. The remaining 16 school districts elect school trustees ‘at large’ and predominately serve only one municipality.

Both the neighbouring school districts to GVSD, Sooke School District (No. 62) and Saanich School District (No. 63), use a model with multiple electoral areas.

Population

The principle of voter parity (representation by population) based on the concept of “one person – one vote” was considered, which is why both Victoria and Saanich have been assigned two trustee seats as both the largest municipal portions that make up the school district both geographically and by population.

Nature of Public Discussion

Public Consultation

On August 5, 2025, in partnership with local First Nations and municipalities and the CRD, the GVSD launched public communications to inform the community of the proposed changes and of the opportunity to submit feedback through an online form and through an in-person engagement session.

Information about the proposed changes as well as an invitation to the public engagement session were sent to the Four Houses (the Esquimalt Nation, the Songhees Nation, the Métis Nation of Greater Victoria, and the Urban Peoples' House Indigenous Advisory), Educational Partners (CUPE 947, CUPE 382, Greater Victoria Teachers' Association, and the Victoria Confederation of Parent Advisory Councils), school Principals and Vice Principals, all GVSD staff, and all GVSD families. The same information was shared on the GVSD website and social media and was sent to local media to support with awareness.

Comments and questions that were received through the online form prior to the public engagement session were compiled and a Frequently Asked Questions document was created. The document was posted on the GVSD website on September 5, 2025, to align with a reminder of the public engagement session which was sent to all of the Rightsholders and stakeholders listed above who received the initial invitation. Copies of the document were also available at the public engagement session.

On September 9, 2025, the Task Force hosted a public engagement session from 7:00pm to 9:00pm at SJ Willis (923 Topaz Avenue). The session included a brief presentation of the proposal, relevant background information, and the purpose of the Task Force. The public was then invited to engage and ask questions of the Task Force, other GVSD staff, and other local representatives of each First Nation and municipality.

Much of the feedback gathered and the questions posed at the in-person session reflected those that we had already heard through the online form. The online form closed on September 11, 2025 and gathered 266 responses.

In summary, the majority of the feedback gathered was positive and reflected support for the proposed changes. A great number of respondents posed thoughtful questions and requested clarifications on specific voter experiences or situations that could arise with a change in electoral model, which we aimed to address through the previously mentioned FAQ document. A subset of the feedback offered alternative suggestions that were either previously considered during Task Force meetings or unachievable for the 2026 election based on existing legal frameworks outlined in the *School Act* and *Local Government Act*. Additionally, there was feedback collected that opposed the changes.

Summary of Request

The GVSD formally submits this proposal and accompanying letter as a request that, pursuant to Section 30 (4) of the *School Act*, the Ministry consider making a variation order prior to the next general school election to be held on October 17, 2026.

As a continued commitment to this process and honoring UNDRIP, the GVSD on behalf of the Task Force call upon local government to continue working with First Nations and Rightsholders to support self-governance and explore the possibility of adjusting the *School Act* to allow for the appointment of trustees from First Nations communities.

Dear Greater Victoria School District 61 Board of Education Chair Nicole Duncan and Trustees:

Re: Consideration of a Trustee Electoral Area election model

I am writing on behalf of the Township of Esquimalt Council to ask that the Greater Victoria School District 61 consider implementing a Trustee Electoral Area election model for the upcoming 2026 Local Government/Board of Education elections.

Key components of the Township of Esquimalt's 2023-2026 Council Priorities involve good governance and organizational excellence as well as strong relationships and partnerships. It is in this spirit we make this request as it could provide improved local area representation.

In supporting these priorities, the Township of Esquimalt Council passed the following motion at our September 23, 2024 meeting:

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Township of Esquimalt ask that the Greater Victoria School District 61 Board of Education consider a Trustee Electoral Area election model to be implemented in time for the 2026 Local Government/Board of Education elections.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Township of Esquimalt author letters to the City of Victoria, District of Saanich, District of Oak Bay, Town of View Royal, District of Highlands, the Songhees Nation and Esquimalt Nation informing them of the Township's request to the Greater Victoria School District 61 Board of Education."



CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ESQUIMALT

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The vast majority of B.C. school districts that serve multiple municipalities, including three of the four school districts within the Capital Regional District, have already implemented a Trustee Electoral Area election model whereby local communities each separately elect their own School Trustee representative(s) to help optimize fair and equitable school board representation among the various communities. We support consultation and representation for First Nations Communities as well. In addition to achieving more geographically balanced representation, such a model would also help make school trustee elections more efficient for each administering municipality as well as improving access and reducing barriers for school trustee candidates while strengthening connectedness between local candidates and their community's voters.

The Township of Esquimalt recognizes and respects your Board of Education's autonomy in selecting the best representation model for electing school trustees within Greater Victoria School District 61.

As such, please give consideration of our request of your Board. If you are agreeable to consideration of our request, we anticipate and appreciate that your consideration will require consultation with each municipality and Indigenous community included within School District 61 as well as approval from the Ministry of Education. By giving this matter consideration now, you are enabled with sufficient time to implement a Trustee Electoral Area model for the 2026 Local Government/Board of Education elections in the event that you ultimately opt to make this change for the school district in which we all share.

- No local community/geographic representation guaranteed.

Appendix B: List of BC School Districts that Elect Trustees Proportionally By Community/Trustee Electoral Areas:

In B.C., there are 60 public school districts of which 44 serve multiple municipalities with representation elected proportionally by community with the Trustee Electoral Area model. The remaining 16 school districts predominately serve only one municipality and, therefore, appropriately elect school trustees at-large within their single municipality (e.g. Vancouver District 39, Burnaby District 41, Richmond District 38, etc.).

In contrast to School District 61, almost all other B.C. school districts that serve more than one municipality have implemented an equitable election by the Trustee Electoral Area system including as follows:

The Township of Esquimalt wishes to congratulate you on your recent appointment as the Official Trustee for the Greater Victoria School District No. 61 (SD 61).

As part of your mandate to restore good governance, strong relationships and partnerships for the Greater Victoria School District 61 Board, I am pleased to advise you that these are values that the Township of Esquimalt shares as an important part of our own strategic priorities.

In supporting these priorities, the Township of Esquimalt Council passed the following motion at our March 4, 2025 Special Council meeting:

“WHEREAS: The vast majority of B.C. School Districts that serve multiple municipalities have implemented a Trustee Electoral Area election model whereby local communities each separately elect their own School Trustee representative(s) to help optimize fair and equitable school board representation among the various municipalities,

AND WHEREAS: Part 4 – Division 1 – Section 30 of the BC School Act grants authority to the Minister of Education to approve and implement a more fair and equitable Trustee Electoral Area election model for electing school board trustees,

AND WHEREAS: the previously elected Greater Victoria School District 61 Board of Education has now been terminated, and a new Board of Education will not be elected until October 2026

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Township of Esquimalt ask the Honourable Lisa Beare, Minister of Education and Child Care, to direct School District 61 to create an inclusive and collaborative task force to consider a Trustee Electoral Area election model for the Minister’s ultimate consideration of approval for implementation in time for the 2026 Local Government/Board of Education elections.



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AND THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Township of Esquimalt author letters to School District 61 official trustee Sherri Bell, the City of Victoria, District of Saanich, District of Oak Bay, Town of View Royal, District of Highlands, the Songhees Nation and Kosapsum (Esquimalt) Nation, as well as area MLAs within School District 61 to inform them of the Township's request to the Minister of Education and Child Care."

Under Part 4 - Division 1 - Section 30 of the BC School Act, the Minister is granted the authority to allow for a Trustee Electoral Area election model for electing school board trustees. Many school districts across British Columbia that serve multiple municipalities have already adopted this model, allowing each community to elect its own School Trustee representative(s) to promote fair and equitable representation on the school board.

The Township of Esquimalt believes that an SD 61-led task force—designed to be inclusive and collaborative with the communities served by SD 61—would be the most effective way to explore, define, and propose designated Trustee Electoral Area boundaries. This proposal could then be submitted for the Minister's consideration and implemented in time for the 2026 Local Government elections.

We are eager for the chance to collaborate with you on the crucial issue of school board representation. Therefore, we kindly ask for your support in our appeal to the Minister. We understand that your decision will involve consultations with every municipality and Indigenous community within SD 61. By addressing this matter promptly, we ensure ample time to establish a Trustee Electoral Area model for the 2026 Local Government elections, should the Minister decide to implement this beneficial change for our school district.

Many British Columbia school districts that serve multiple municipalities have already implemented a Trustee Electoral Area election model whereby local communities each separately elect their own School Trustee representative(s) to help optimize fair and equitable school board representation among the various municipalities.

With regards to Greater Victoria School District No. 61 (SD 61) which includes the Township of Esquimalt, five other municipalities and two First Nations, there is no Trustee Electoral Area election model in place. Instead, SD 61 school trustees are elected at-large, which we have found to be an inequitable and problematic form of representation.

On behalf of Chief and Council of Esquimalt Nation, we are writing to express our strong support for the transition from an “at large” election model to an electoral area model for school trustee elections within our region. We further call for the formal inclusion of designated seats on the Board of Education for the two local Nations whose territories the school district resides on.

The current “at large” model positions the community to have unequal representation for smaller or geographically distinct areas. An electoral area model offers an opportunity to improve democratic participation, increase local accountability, and ensure that decisions about education reflect the unique priorities and lived experiences of diverse communities within the school district.


For Esquimalt Nation, this issue is deeply connected to our inherent rights as Indigenous peoples. Our students attend local schools governed by the Board of Education, yet the Nation has limited say in the decision-making processes that affect our learners. This gap contradicts the Province of British Columbia’s commitment to advancing reconciliation through the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act (DRIPA). Designating seats for the Songhees and Esquimalt Nations is not simply a gesture of inclusion—it is a step toward Indigenous jurisdiction, self-determination, and reconciliation. It ensures that educational governance is informed by the voices, values, and priorities of the First Peoples on whose lands the school district operates.


The province has made significant commitments to Indigenous students through the Equity in Action Framework and Local Education Agreements (LEAs). Expanding our presence into governance structures is a natural and necessary next step. 
