Sweater Day

What is Sweater Day?

During a Sweater Day, students and staff celebrate climate action together by wearing sweaters to school as the heat to the school gets turned down a little bit for one day. The goal of the event is to showcase how a small action can have a big impact on our carbon footprint.

Schools are invited to pick a theme (e.g. ugly sweaters, school colours, etc.) or create challenges amongst students (e.g. Grades 9 and 10 versus Grades 11 and 12), to ensure awareness.

To ensure your event is a success, district staff will:

- Help advertise the event for several weeks in advance by providing posters that include school colours and logos
- Provide “Sweater Day” water bottle stickers
- Turn down the school temperature (not too much)
- Provide 20 minutes classroom presentations (scheduled in advance) about greenhouse gases and how they relate to our schools heating systems
- Collect room temperature data to improve future efficiency and comfort
