

Black History Month Resources 2026

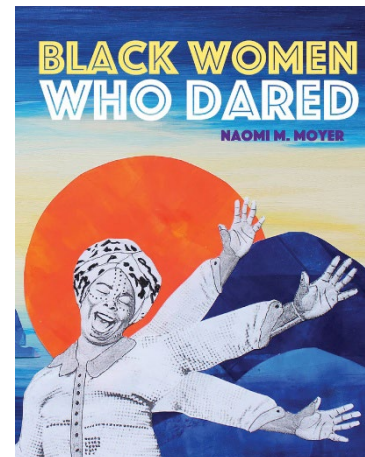

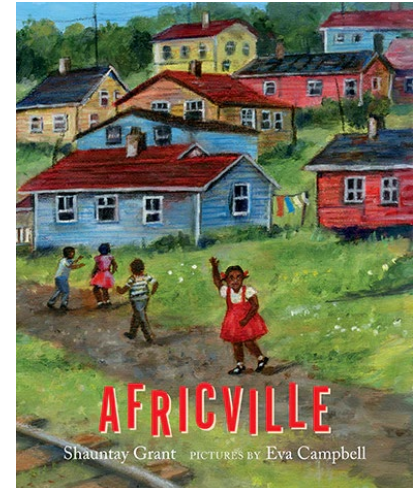
Print Resources

- [Black Women Who Dared](#) by Naomi M. Moyer (Middle/Secondary)
A collection of stories about ten inspirational Black women from both Canadian and American histories. A celebration of their contributions, leadership, and trailblazing.
- [Victoria World Heritage – A Black History of Victoria](#)
Chronicles the history of Black settlers in Victoria in the 1800's. Read about past prominent members of the Black community of Victoria and their stories, hardships, and contributions.

- Writing Canada's Wrongs: Africville, An African Nova Scotian Community is Demolished and Fights Back by Gloria Ann Wesley (Middle/Secondary)

A small Black community in Nova Scotia in the 1800s called Africville faces discrimination and threat of demolition by the City of Halifax.

- Africville by Shauntay Grand (Elementary/Middle/Secondary)
A picture book about a young girl who visits the site of Africville in Halifax, Nova Scotia. She is then transported back to the lived experiences of this historical community.



- Celebrating Black Canadians

An article written by teacher Nikitha Fester for the BCTF Teacher Magazine. The article includes a list of resources as well as visual arts lesson plans for teachers related to Black artists.

- Viola Desmond Won't Be Budged by Jody Nyasha Warner (Elementary/Middle)
In 1946, Viola Desmond was asked to give up her seat on the main floor of a movie theatre and move to the balcony. Knowing she was being moved because of the colour of her skin, Viola did not budge. Desmond was an inspiration and a symbol of strength and courage for the Black community in Nova Scotia and Canada during a time of racial segregation.
- The ABCs of Black History by Rio Cortez (Elementary)
Letter by letter, rhyme by rhyme, this book celebrates the milestones and triumphs as well as honouring the hardships and hopes of Black history within North America.
- Timelines from Black History: Leaders, Legends and Legacies by Mireille Harper (Middle)
This book introduces readers to important and leading Black men and women in history. The book provides timelines and other visual elements.
- Young, Gifted, and Black by Jamia Wilson (Elementary/Middle/Secondary)
A collection of 52 changemakers, leaders, and groundbreakers of colour from the past and of the present. No matter what your talent, passions, skills may be, there was or is someone out there who looks just like you!
- Good Night Stories for Rebel Girls: 100 Real-Life Tales of Black Girl Magic edited by Lilly Workneh (Elementary/Middle/Secondary)

A celebration of stories, contributions, and lived experiences of remarkable Black women around the world from the past and present.

- [Mae Among the Stars by Roda Ahmed](#) (Elementary/Middle)
A heartwarming picture book about hope and dreaming big! Mae Jemison worked for NASA and was the first Black American woman to travel in space.
